

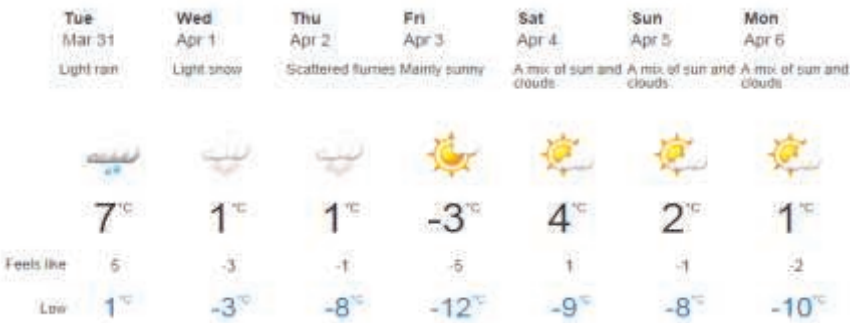

## FLAGGING & TAGGING

When properly utilized, flagging allows for clear communication of work in an area that may pose a hazard to workers entering the area.

When doing a change in work that will cause a temporary increase in congestion, tripping hazards, or other potential hazards, stop the task, and take the time to flag the area. Ensure flagging is properly tagged to communicate contact information, and the reason for the flagging.

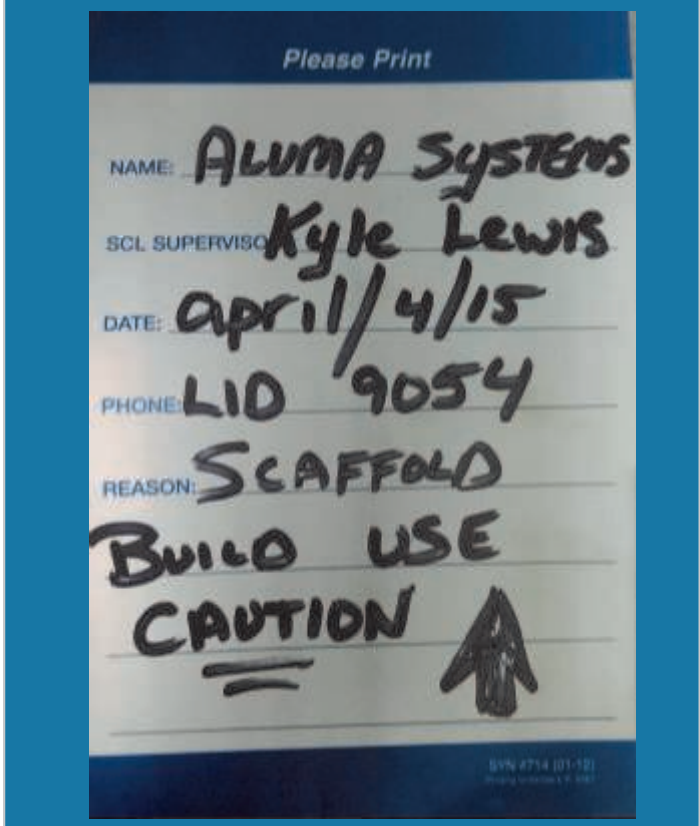
**Yellow** - Caution—Flagged area can be entered after reading the tag and fully understanding the hazards in the area.

**Red**—Danger – Do not enter without permission from the owner of the flagging.
