## CHANGING ENVIRONMENTAL CONDITIONS

Changing environmental conditions increase the risk of hazards. Tripping hazards and slippery surfaces can be hidden by fresh snow, increasing the severity of hazards we are already faced with. Rising temperatures increase the risk of falling ice and slushy roads and walkways. This time of year there are significant temperature changes throughout a shift. This leads to changing hazards.

When working conditions change for any reason, it is important to stop and take the time to update your FLRA, identify and mitigate any new hazards, and make everyone in the area aware of the changes.

It is crucial that we all work in the moment, stay focused on the task at hand and take the time to continuously reassess the hazards as we start, work on and complete every task we do. As you proceed through each step, take a moment to reassess your work area and your PPE. Prevent injuries from happening by being aware, and prepared for changing conditions.

### DID YOU KNOW?

Seasonally impacted poor visibility and high levels of traffic create an high risk hazard in the Logistics Yard. For this reason it is a requirement to wear a high visibility vest when working in the Logistics Yard.

- Vests must identify you above and beyond your work clothes normal reflective striping.
- Vests must have high contrasting base color (yellow & orange work well against the red or blue coveralls).
- Vests must be fire resistant and display reflective stripes.

## INTERACTION HIGHLIGHTS!

- Scaffolders stopped workers from entering an area and flagged the area off due to overhead ice that looked like it might fall.
- A crew was loading welding machines onto a picker truck using the picker. They were not using tag lines and had their hands on the live loads. Foreman intervened and recommended the use of tag lines to remove line of fire potential to their hands.

These interactions may have prevented someone from being injured. It is critical that we all make it a priority to interact with each other and continue to make working safe our priority.
